

This is me with my fiancé Emily. This photo is from the last time we were able to go to Songkran in Thai Town. I can't wait to go back post-pandemic!






When it comes to civil society, the above points also applies to civil society tools. One example of closed source tool is Google Maps API. Google advertises its product that there are 25 million updates daily and cover 99% of the world. Thus, closed source can be harmful in term of cost, while open source can be harmful in term of usability and service.

Moreover, the accessibility of open source software makes it an attractive tool for community-based organizations which may not have the budget for proprietary software that organizations in the private and public sector have. Open source software poses an alternative to proprietary, closed-source software that is frequently updated -- a quick turnover that is incentivized by commercial interests. They pose alternatives to corporate software that are widely used by the mainstream, which often are falsely framed as the sole choices for software uses.
